Reading

The deepest and oldest freshwater lake in the world, Lake Baikal holds approximately 20% of the Earth's fresh surface water. Located in Siberia, Baikal spans over 30 000 square kilometres, and is especially known for the high quality of its waters. It is sometimes possible to see as far as 40 metres below the surface.

Home to thousands of species of plants and animals, Lake Baikal is incredibly diverse. Interestingly, some of the animals that are native to Baikal don't live anywhere else in the world, such as the Baikal Seal.

People from far and wide travel to Lake Baikal, even in winter when temperatures drop so low that the surface of the lake freezes. Baikal's freezing winters make it a great location for extreme sports. Most famously, Baikal hosts an annual Ice Marathon where participants run over the frozen lake, sometimes having to avoid cracks as the ice shifts.
